

PROMINENT PEOPLE BURIED IN THE KAYSVILLE CITY CEMETERY

- **Elias Adams**

Born: 2-18-1792 in Barre, Vermont

Died: 2-17-1886

Burial location: B-9-1-7

Married: Almira Cadwell and Malinda Railey

One of 25 voters in Illinois who organized a new county in 1825 named Adams County (after newly elected U.S. President John Quincy Adams) and named the county seat Quincy, fought many battles in the War of 1812 with the U.S. Army's First Rifle Regiment, worked on the Nauvoo Temple, was called to be a Branch President at Mt. Pisgah, Iowa, and grew food and milled flour for the pioneers who were crossing the plains between 1846-1850, Adams Canyon was named after him because he led pioneers through the mouth of this canyon to settle Layton and Kaysville.

- **William Robert Allen**

Born: 1-1-1849 in London, England

Married Mary Sims

Architect/builder (built the Kaysville LDS Tabernacle, Kaysville Presbyterian Church, Barnes Block, Davis County Courthouse and many residential homes), joined the Kaysville Brass Band at age 16 (played the coronet and violin), went deaf at age 30.

- **Emily Stewart Barnes**

Born: 5-3-1846 in Colmworth, Bedfordshire, England

Her farther, William Stewart, was an early settler and first shoemaker in Kaysville. When Emily grew to womanhood her versatility and capabilities were so outstanding that she won both admiration and respect from the community. Not only could she pluck snagged wool from sagebrush, card it, spin it, dye it, weave it, and make it into a dress, but she could also grow flax, prepare it and make it into table linen. She could tan hides and make them into shoes; gather straw, strip it, dye it and make it into hats. She made soap and provided the kitchen with salt and soda prepared from the wild lands. She knew everything that grew in the desert, valley and mountain. She gathered chockcherries, service berries and haws for fruit; sunflower seeds for bread; rose leaves for tea; mushrooms, edible roots, and succulent leaves for other foods. She knew every root and herb helpful as a remedy and also how to use and supply them in aid of the sick. She could make aprons, suits or wedding dresses. She would put up fruit by the hundreds of bottles, make pickles, corn beef and cure hams and nothing was ever wasted. Pulp from jelly was made into wine, barley into beer and

dandelions on the wayside were gathered, their blossoms made into wine and their leaves put into a salad. Her home, from cellar to attic, was spotless with everything neatly packaged and stored in its place. As a cook, she was so famous that several of her recipes have become notable in Utah's cuisine. She gathered soda and salt from the shores of the Great Salt Lake. Her table, when set as a full course affair, was a masterpiece with every accountment of silverware, hand-painted china, delicate glasses and fine linen. The President and Twelve Apostles of the LDS Church were as well-known at her table as her uncles. At one time, the entire Quorum of the Twelve met in solemn conclave in her living room. She was calm, methodical, confident, unhurried and soft-spoken. She was admired for her ambition, efficiency, honesty, work, resourcefulness, tranquility and culture.

Married Emily Shelton, Elizabeth Geaves and Emily Stewart

Mayor of Kaysville City (1916-1918), first Kaysville school teacher, founded Barnes Bank in 1891, formed the Kaysville Co-operative Mercantile Institute (KCMI) in 1868, was an original director of ZCMI in Salt Lake City, opened the Kaysville Canning Company (1902), donated land along with a few other citizens for construction of Davis High School in 1914, donated \$6,000 to help in construction of the Kaysville LDS Tabernacle.

Married Kay Hardy

President and CEO of Barnes Bank for 31 years, Director of Federal Reserve Bank of Salt Lake City, President of the Utah Bankers' Association, son of Governor Henry Hooper Blood.

 Utah's 7th Governor (1932-1936 - first Governor to occupy the mansion donated by the Thomas F. Kearns family), Chairman of the Utah State Road Commission, first President of the Board of Education for the Davis County School District, Manager of the Kaysville Milling Company.
- Jane Wilkie Hooper Blood**
 Born: 5-2-1845 in South Hampton, Hampshire, England
 Died: 9-7-1898
 Burial location: B-21-3-2
 Married William Blood
 First Kaysville LDS Primary President (1879).
- Monte James Brough**
 Born: 6-11-1939 in Randolph, Utah
 Died: 9-20-2011
 Burial location C-11-6-5
 Married Lanette Barker
 He served many notable callings in the LDS Church: Bishop, member of the Young Men General Board regional representative, member of the First Quorum of the Seventy (1988-1989), Second Quorum of the Seventy (1989-1991), First Quorum of the Seventy (1991-2007), Presidency of the Seventy (1993-1998) and General Authority Emeritus (2007-2011).
- Hubert Charles Burton**
 Born: 6-6-1876 in Kaysville, Utah
 Died: 8-26-1950
 Burial location: A-5-33-7
 Married Millie Criddle
 First Principal of Kaysville Elementary School (1901-1909), Superintendent of Schools (1909-1945), Burton Elementary was named after him.
- William Perry Epperson**
 Born: 9-23-1859 in Galesburg, Illinois
 Died: 12-31-1930
 Burial location: D-2-16-3
 Married Leonora Ash
 Editor and manager of the Weekly Reflex from 1912-1930, honored by the Utah Press Association for producing the best weekly newspaper, owner of Inland Printing Company, editor of the Ogden Post, member of the Utah Legislature (1927), Kaysville City Councilman (1914-1918), President of the Utah Press Association (1918-1930).

- Sumner Gleason**
 Born: 5-11-1860 in Malden, Massachusetts
 Died: 5-4-1944
 Burial location: D-2-17-15
 Married Edith Crawford
 Mayor of Kaysville City (1912-1914), Kaysville City physician and dentist (1916-1939), organized the Davis County School Health and County health programs, first Davis County school doctor, practiced horticulture, typesetting, hypnotism, writing, and art, ran a small canning plant where he processed grape juice, corn, peaches and buffalo meat from the herd on Antelope Island, developed the Stark Early Elberta Peach (also known as the Gleason Elberta Peach).
- Samuel Lane Jones**
 Born: 4-14-1828 in Kidderminster, Worcestershire, England
 Died: 11-17-1891
 Burial location: D-32-2-2
 Married Martha Simmons
 Expert sculptor of headstones made from marble, sandstone and other materials, created lion sculptures located at the Lion House in Salt Lake City, crafted soldier statue at north entrance of the Fort Douglas Cemetery.
- Christopher Layton**
 Born: 3-8-1821 in Thorncote, Bedfordshire, England
 Died: 8-7-1898
 Burial location: A-2-14-11
 Married Caroline Cooper, Mary Matthews, Martha Otterson, Sarah Martin, Sarah Barnes, Isabella Golightly, Rosa Ann Hudson, Hannah Maria Septima Sims, Mary Jane Roberts, Elizabeth Hannah Williams
 Legislator of the State of Utah, Member of Mormon Battalion, colonized communities in Utah, Nevada, and Arizona, organized the Farmer's Union in Layton, opened the first independent store in Kaysville, helped erect the first telegraph lines in Utah, Layton City was named after him.
- James Henry Linford**

 Married Zillah Crockett
 Mayor of Kaysville City (1882-1886), first Kaysville Sunday School Superintendent (1880).

 Married Ada McKinnon
 Principal of Davis High School for 21 years (1925-1946), Superintendent of Schools (1953-1958), Morgan Elementary School was named after him.
- Thomas Francis Roueche**
 Born: 2-9-1833 in Lincoln, North Carolina
 Died: 9-12-1903
 Burial location: A-1-23-2
 Married Margaret Comish
 First Kaysville City Mayor (1868-1872), hid polygamists in his home, LDS President John Taylor (third President of the LDS Church) died in his home while hiding as an underground polygamist (July 25, 1887).
- Newell V. “Hod” and Clover Johnson Sanders**
 Hod Born: 3-25-1900 in Farmington, Utah
 Hod Died: 5-3-1980
 Burial location: A-2-5-6
 Clover Born: 11-2-1903 in Price, Utah
 Clover Died: 12-24-1999
 Burial location: A-2-5-4
 Founders of the Clover Club Potato Chip Factory (1938).
- Heber John Sheffield**
 Born: 5-29-1834 in Wellingborough, England
 Died: 8-1-1936
 Burial location: B-36-4-6
 Married Sarah Harriet Blamires
 Mayor of Kaysville City (1903-1904, 1906-1908, 1914-1916), owner of H. J. Sheffield & Sons Mercantile Company located at 59 North Main (opened in 1889 and closed in 1937).
- Sterling W. Sill**
 Born: 3-31-1903 in Layton, Utah
 Died: 5-25-1994
 Burial location: E-2-56-12
 Married Doris Mary Thornley
 Assistant to the Twelve Apostles of the LDS Church (1954-1976), First Quorum of Seventy of the LDS Church (1976-1978), Emeritus General Authority of the LDS Church (1978-1994), Member of the Board of Regents at the University of Utah (1940-1951), received honorary law degree from University of Utah (1953), received the Carnegie Hero Medal in 1960 for saving a drowning boy.

- Annie Barnes Smith**
 Born: 3-6-1817 in Sandy, Bedfordshire, England
 Died: 6-5-1871
 Burial location: A-5-32-1
 Married William Brown Smith
 First Kaysville LDS Relief Society President (1868).
- Leconte Stewart**
 Born: 4-15-1891 in Glenwood, Utah
 Died: 6-2-1990
 Burial location: B-29-2-9
 Married Zipporah Layton
 Famous landscape artist, head of the Art Department at the University of Utah (1938-1956), painted murals for several LDS buildings including the Laie, Hawaii, Alberta, Canada and Mesa, Arizona temples, created a mural for the Salt Lake International Airport.
- George Darling Watt**
 Born: 1-15-1815 in Manchester, Lancashire, England
 Died: 10-24-1881
 Burial location: B-40-1-1
 Married Mary (Mollie) Gregson, Jane Brown, Martha Bench, Elizabeth Golightly and Sarah Harter
 Won a foot race to become England's first Mormon convert, became the first stenographer for Brigham Young and the LDS Church and was official scribe of the LDS Church from 1851-1870, master of Pitman shorthand (wrote speeches complete and verbatim), co-creator of the thirty-eight character Deseret Alphabet, planted the first mulberry seeds in the area and raised silk worms imported from France and started the silk industry, went to the Mormon settlements and taught people how to care for the worms and cultivate mulberry trees.
- John Weinel**
 Born: 11-25-1813 in Merxheim, Germany
 Died: 2-2-1889
 Burial location: A-2-13-6
 Married Frances Ball Flint, Alice Daniels and Eleanor Warmouth Reily (aka Ellen Foote)
 Ordained a Seventy in the 31st Quorum of the LDS Church (1851), built first flour mill in Kaysville (1854), pioneer monument was dedicated in his honor in June 1947 by Daughters of the Utah Pioneers which contains an original mill stone as the base of a flag pole.

- **Edward Morris Whitesides**

Born: 1-23-1865 in Kaysville, Utah

Died: 8-18-1960

Burial location: A-5-6-4

Married Mary Harvey

Superintendent of Schools (1901-1909), Principal of Kaysville Elementary (1909-1932), teacher at Davis High School, E.M. Whitesides Elementary (Layton) was named after him.

- **Ada Evans Williams**

Born: 5-1-1838 in Cardiff, Wales

Died: 2-2-1923

Burial location: A-5-28-1

Married Ebenezer A. Williams

Her husband opened the first mercantile store in Kaysville, first Kaysville LDS Mutual Improvement Association President (1876).
